Online program recognized by Forbes Advisor

Education

Forbes Advisor Education recently recognized UIU for offering one of the best online bachelor's degrees in public administration. Upper lowa and nine other U.S. institutions were recognized. To determine the 2023 rankings, Forbes Advisor Education sourced data from the National



Center for Education Statistics and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, as well as utilizing an expert advisory board of professionals and educator reviews to verify and ensure content accuracy. The methodology used included 16 data points in various categories weighted by student outcomes, affordability, the student experience, credibility and the application process. The 10 best schools were selected using a curved final score of 71.73% or higher. The ranked schools were all fully accredited, had higher student retention rates, and were nonprofit institutions with relatively low percentages of students in federal student loan deferment.

Science and environment club prepare for the 2024 cicada emergence



In collaboration with the lowa Department of Natural Resources, UIU's Conservation Management and Science and Environment Club students are conducting a multiyear research project. The initiative will evaluate the availability, use and benefits of the 17-year periodical cicada emergence in 2024 for Driftless Region fish like Brown and Brook Trout. While the use and benefits of this massive insect emergence have been well documented for terrestrial consumers, the benefits of this rarely available resource to aquatic organisms have not been studied.

The goal of this study is to better understand and characterize the ecological linkages between this rarely available resource subsidy and fish populations. With the help of donors to the club's crowdfunding campaign, many of whom were UIU alumni, almost \$6,000 was raised to purchase equipment used for evaluating the availability of cicadas to stream fish. During the summer of 2023, students assisted in collecting baseline data from 20 streams throughout lowa's Driftless Region. During the 2024 cicada emergence, students and faculty will use stream drift samples, fish gut content analysis, isotopic analysis and population surveys to better understand the ecological benefits of this rare resource subsidy for stream fish.

Ecology class helps the Iowa National Heritage Foundation with ecological restoration



Dr. Jennifer Stoffel's BIO 335 Ecology class for conservation management took a trip to a property in northeast lowa to learn more about ecological principles and practices in land stewardship that the Iowa National Heritage Foundation (INHF) uses. The INHF is a nonprofit organization that focuses on protecting and restoring lowa's land, water and wildlife.

UIU named a "Best for Vets" college

Upper Iowa University was recently named a "Best for Vets" college by Military Times. UIU ranked 16th in the primarily online category. "The UIU faculty and staff deeply appreciate the commitment of servicemembers to our country," said UIU Director of Military and Veterans Affairs Brandy Branstetter. We take pride in providing students an education built for life."



According to the Military Times, the Best for Vets: Colleges 2023 rankings represent the most comprehensive annual ranking of schools for military service members and veterans. These rankings play a crucial role in aiding these individuals in making informed decisions about their educational pursuits.

Master of Arts in Psychology launching Fall 2024

UIU will be offering a Master of Arts in Psychology program! This new program will be offered entirely online. Students will have an opportunity to get to know the faculty teaching the program and will have direct opportunities to interact with their peers. All students sign paperwork prior to meeting with a counselor that states whether they want Gypsy in their sessions or not.

Numerous studies show that interacting with animals helps to lower blood pressure, increase engagement, and reduce anxiety and depression. This year, Gypsy has been well received by students, with 74.4% of students reporting that having her in the counseling center would make them more likely to schedule an appointment.

Makerspace is a one-credit course offering students an opportunity to enhance their marketing and social media skills. pper Iowa University's 'University Recruits' are being featured in the Civil War Digital Digest. Created by Civil War enthusiast Will Eichler, the Civil War Digital Digest is a YouTube series dedicated to exploring various aspects of Civil War history. The episode features fellow Civil War collector Mike Huston, who details the story of the UIU students who contributed to and enlisted for the Civil War in Company F of the 3rd Iowa Infantry and Company C of the 12th Iowa Infantry.

What is unique about the students is their efforts to recruit others from the area to join them and enlist. This brave group ultimately formed Company C of the 12th Iowa Infantry, otherwise known at the time as the University Recruits. The contributions of UIU's students extended beyond mere enlistment. Women from Upper Iowa hand-sewed the flag that accompanied the recruits to war and elected the color bearer for the company as well.

Company C of the 12th Iowa Infantry was most notably involved in the Battle of Shiloh, with the survivors subsequently serving as prisoners of war, some for up to eight months. Upon their release as part of a trade between the Union and the Confederates, they took part in subsequent engagements at Memphis, Vicksburg and Spanish Fort.


Postwar, several members made significant contributions to American society, with members such as D.W. Reid and David Henderson play significant roles in historical preservation and politics, showcasing the enduring legacy of UIU's University Recruits.

Over the years, UIU has received and displayed artifacts related to the University Recruits and the Civil War, including personal belongings of the students, a field desk and a UIU engraved Enfield Rifle, along with papers and letters that offer a poignant glimpse into the experiences of the UIU students. These artifacts can be found

in the Henderson-Wilder Library on the Fayette Campus.

The Civil War Digital Digest's "The University Recruits" takes an inside look into the historical highlights of those recruits during the Civil War, sharing the soldier stories and highlighting their efforts in a captivating and very educational way.

Duffys leave lasting legacy

une 30, 2024, will mark the end of an era at Upper Iowa University, as longtime President Bill Duffy will officially retire from UIU. Dr. Duffy announced his intentions to retire this past spring and is serving out the remainder of his time at UIU in a full-time fundraising role with the University. Inaugurated as Upper Iowa's 21st president in 2013, Duffy was the institution's longest-serving president since Dr. Eugene Garbee and, like Garbee, was named President Emeritus by the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Duffy's tenure at UIU overlapped with rapid and dynamic change at both Upper Iowa and throughout higher education. *The Bridge* sat down with President Emeritus Duffy to discuss his proudest accomplishments, reflections on the future and what he'll miss most about UIU in his retirement. Bridge: First of all, congratulations on your retirement. What is the one thing you think about first when you reflect on your time at UIU?

Duffy: First and foremost, Sharon and I will ALWAYS cherish the time spent with members of our Peacock family, who have been so very committed to the future success of UIU, and our students. Many of you have heard me say, "No employee is more important than any other employee; we simply have different duties and responsibilities." As such, our BEST memories have always been, and will always be, the lifelong relationships we have made with our UIU employees, students, alumni/friends, and our Board of Trustees. Words cannot adequately express how honored and blessed we are to have had you all in our lives throughout this journey. For the record, we're not done yet, and I have NO DOUBT our UIU family will continue to ensure the future success of our students and UIU!

Bridge: As you begin to look back at your tenure as UIU's 21st president, what are a couple of the accomplishments that make you especially proud?

Duffy: First and foremost, I consider any accomplishment to be the result of total teamwork, and I give full credit to all of our Peacock family members who spent much time planning, working overtime, collaborating, and doing everything possible to ensure the future success of our students and UIU. Having said this, here are a few achievements I'm especially proud of:

- 1. Maintaining and improving UIU's accreditation: The most recent accreditation results are the BEST results I've seen in my 14+ years at UIU. I especially thank VP Doug Binsfeld for his invaluable knowledge and experience with the accreditation process and Dr. Billie Cowley '03, '08, dean for Academic and Educational Affairs, for her outstanding academic leadership. To everyone else involved, THANK YOU ALL for your teamwork and total commitment to UIU's success!
- Establishing UIU's current core values and strategic plan:
 Core values and a concise strategic plan are essential to the success of any organization. In addition, every organization needs to periodically review and update these documents. Accordingly, UIU involved all stakeholders in strategic plans throughout my

presidency and implemented, were guided by and continually assessed initiatives throughout the year at all levels.

- 3. Increasing UIU's endowment: Since becoming UIU's president, the University endowment has more than doubled, growing from \$9 million to over \$20 million currently. We have done this by adding more restricted endowments for scholarships and programs and, even more importantly, generated support for UIU's unrestricted endowment. A BIG THANKS to VP Andrew Wenthe and the entire alumni and advancement team for being part of this effort!
- 4. Becoming a member of the Great Lakes Valley Conference:
 During my third year as president, it became fairly clear that the
 Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC) Conference
 was not a good fit for UIU. Previously, our staff and our studentathletes were competing with large public universities, traveling
 long distances (a 13-hour bus trip to Minot State was very
 challenging for the student-athletes and their studies), dealing
 with numerous competition cancellations due to severe and
 unsafe winter driving conditions, and having to pay much higher
 travel expenses for travel and lodging! Typically, it takes two or
 three years to move from one NCAA conference to another. UIU
 completed the entire process in less than one year. Kudos to VP
 Rick Hartzell and his staff for helping to ensure the future safety
 and success of our student-athletes!

Bridge: Your wife, Sharon, was UIU's first lady for over 10 years and was involved in several UIU initiatives. Please describe what Sharon meant to UIU throughout your tenure as UIU's president.

Duffy: Without question, Sharon's role as first lady made a huge impact during our time at UIU. Not only is she my partner in life; she was my partner in everything UIU! She was always by my side, attending functions, sporting events and alumni visits. She loved to entertain and was always willing to host gatherings at our home.

She was involved in many initiatives at the university. The first was the renovation of the president's residence. When I first became president,

the president's residence needed a major renovation. We formed a committee to help with decisions, raised money for two years, and were finally able to move in during our third year. It was important to Sharon and me to maintain the integrity of the home and to honor those who came before us. She also wanted to make sure it felt warm and inviting, not like a museum. We hosted so many events there, gave tours and made sure everyone knew they were always welcome. We are so grateful to everyone who helped out with this project, with a very special thank-you to Chris Andres, the late Diane Harms, and the EYE girls, who all spent many hours helping and providing resources to ensure the renovation was successful!

The second big initiative that Sharon took on was the President's Ball (it was her idea to have a formal event similar to the military balls we attended annually throughout my military career). It was important to us to have an event each year to raise money and to bring awareness to the importance of giving back to the university. This was a night when we brought our entire UIU community together — staff, faculty, sponsors, alumni, students and community members — to say thank you for all they do to support UIU! Thus far, the President's Ball has raised nearly \$1.5 million! We will forever be grateful for everyone who made this event so special!

Sharon loved our students as though they were part of our own family. At the beginning of each new school year, we would walk through all the dorms while new students were moving in to make sure they were happy. Afterward, we would host a Bon Voyage event at the president's residence for the parents. We would serve coffee and cookies — and Kleenex. The point of all of this was to get to know the students from day one and to let the parents know that they were leaving their children in good hands.

Bridge: You've described your current fundraising role at UIU as "your final UIU mission." Describe what you mean by that and what you hope to accomplish before your retirement.

Duffy: UIU established an \$8 million fundraising goal for the 15-month period prior to my retirement in June 2024. As of early December 2023, we have achieved a little more than \$5.8 million toward that significant goal. However, while UIU has received a number of large gifts to help ensure UIU can achieve our fundraising goal, it is essential in the future for even more alumni to get involved as donors to UIU. Specifically, I'm appealing to all UIU alumni and friends to please consider the impact of giving smaller donations on a recurring basis (monthly, quarterly or annually).

I will provide you with the perfect example of how we can significantly increase donors for UIU. Nearly three years ago, I received a call from UIU alumni Tom Gray '72. Tom is a dear and humble friend whom I met early in my presidency. He is a retired teacher and lives in Iowa. He briefly mentioned that he had just experienced some very difficult surgery, was isolated for 20 days with another medical issue and was dealing with COVID-19!

Shortly after his update, Tom asked, "Can I help UIU in any way?" I thanked Tom, and let him know we had everything under control. I then asked Tom if he goes out to eat often, and he said, "Often enough." I said, "Well how about instead of eating out one day a

month, take that \$25 and consider donating that amount to UIU every month?" He said, "Hmmm, I'll think about it." Three months later, Tom called and said, "President Duffy, it's working, and I'm increasing the amount!" His goal is now to give \$80 per month. Bridge: The Board has granted you the title of President Emeritus, a special honor at UIU. Any final thoughts or "words of wisdom" you would like to share with your Peacock family?

Duffy: Simply stated, it has been the greatest honor in our lives to serve UIU as a vice president, president, and first lady for the past 14+ years. The GREATEST part of UIU are our dedicated Board members, our employees who have weathered many challenging storms, and our wonderful alumni and friends who are committed to UIU's future success! We will also miss being engaged with our students and their families on a day-to-day basis; however, we will always continue to stay in touch with many of our Peacock family members and, of course, watch UIU compete in Athletics!

As for "words of wisdom," here are some that I'm sure a few employees have heard me say occasionally: Always give credit to your employees, and accept the responsibility for failures; once a decision is made, own it as your own; bad news never gets better; set the standards for others to emulate; people don't care how much you know until they know how much you care; keep it simple; bottom line up front; if it's really important, call or visit me; I'm a Times Roman, 12 font guy; and HOOAH! Lastly, I want to say a special thank-you to Andrew Wenthe, Kathy Franken and Holly Wolff, who have all been working side by side with me throughout most of my years at UIU!



Upper Iowa University announces 22nd president

The Board of Trustees at Upper Iowa University has named **Kathy Franken '12** MHEA, as the University's 22nd president. This marks a milestone in UIU history, as Franken is the first woman president to lead the University.

"Since becoming interim president in May 2023, Kathy has led the University through a number of critical initiatives, which made it clear that Kathy is the right individual at the right time to assume this very important role," said UIU Board of Trustees Chairman, Scott Lebin. "The Board of Trustees has considerable faith and trust in Kathy's ability to effectively serve as president, as well as the entire leadership team, faculty and staff who work tirelessly to fulfill UIU's mission."

Franken led Upper Iowa through a process of reimagining UIU's academic offerings, athletic offerings and geographic locations. She also provided direction on the "Reimagine UIU" strategic plan, restructuring University leadership positions and efforts to reduce operating expenses.

Franken's tenure at UIU started in the Waterloo Center in 2008, beginning as an academic advisor to adult learners before assuming the Waterloo Center director position. Before serving as interim president, Franken was vice president for Finance and Enrollment Management, overseeing University finances, Business Office Services, Facilities Management, Information Technology, Enrollment Management and Services, and Auxiliary Services.

"I am humbled and honored to become Upper Iowa's $22^{\rm nd}$ president," shared Franken. "I look forward to continued momentum for UIU that is driven by collaboration, and a student-centered learning and living environment. From my earliest days as an academic advisor, I have recognized the important role Upper Iowa plays in helping students reach their educational goals while supporting the workforce

EMERGING ALUMNI AWARD – Bridget Saffold '20



Bridget earned her Bachelor of Science in Nursing in 2020, utilizing UIU's online platform. In 2015, she launched Focus on Diabetes, a nonprofit organization promoting additional diabetes education beyond the clinic. During the pandemic, this evolved as she recognized an incredible need in her community. Diabetic patients were struggling to gain access to

essential supplies, resulting in alarming life-or-death situations.

She acted swiftly and launched the "Focus on Diabetes COVID-19 Assist Program," which provided supplies to more than 200 individuals. She and a team of volunteers would drop off supplies at the doorsteps of those who were in need and also arranged for drivethrough and other pickup locations throughout the community. Bridget's organization partners with Allen College of Nursing and Hawkeye Community College to immerse health care students in the community and provide hands-on learning opportunities.

In the fall of 2022, Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds declared Sept. 5-10 as Focus on Diabetes Week in Iowa due to the success of Bridget's annual event raising awareness and offering health screenings. Her organization continues to expand. Project Health, a prostate cancer initiative, was recently launched to improve services and the screening process in Black Hawk County.

In addition to her nonprofit, Bridget is also a clinic operations supervisor for MercyOne. Currently, she resides in Waterloo, Iowa.

SERVICE TO COMMUNITY AWARD — William Kunzman '69



Bill earned his Bachelor of Science in 1969, majoring in mathematics and physics. For the last 23 years, Bill and his wife, Phyllis, wintered in Mission, Texas. At age 85, one might assume he was enjoying the typical retirement community activities. But not Bill. He became involved in and took over Mabel's Building

Mission, leading a group of retired senior citizens in building homes for impoverished families in Mexico.

He spearheaded a team of volunteers who would drive nearly two hours twice each week, October through May, to build modest homes measuring 12 by 16 feet, accommodating up to six people and all of their basic needs. Each home costs approximately \$2,000, so he would also organize fundraising efforts to complete the project. He shared with friends once that he couldn't believe how much someone would generously contribute for one apple pie! For his years of service, it's estimated Bill was responsible for the completion of 540 homes, impacting nearly 3,000 young couples and children.

Completely community-minded, Bill poured his heart and soul into countless organizations back in Iowa, including St. John Lutheran Church in Nashua, Strawberry Point Jaycees, Nashua City Council, Park Board, Ambulance Service, VFW Post, Meals on Wheels and more.

Sadly, Bill passed away on Aug. 14, 2023, after a short battle with lung cancer. His family knows he would have been extremely honored to receive this recognition.

PROFESSIONAL ACCOMPLISHMENT AWARD — Carl Hargrave '76



Carl graduated with a Bachelor of Science in physical education in 1976. Some of you may recall him as a star defensive back on the Peacock football team, earning first-team All-Conference honors all four years. He was drafted by the NFL's Oakland Raiders soon after graduation and later returned to the UIU

campus to join the Peacock coaching staff until 1980.

Carl excelled at coaching football alongside some rather noteworthy mentors at the collegiate and professional levels, including Northwestern University, the University of Iowa, the University of Pittsburg, the University of Houston, Mesa Community College, the Minnesota Vikings and the Arizona Cardinals.

In 2015, Carl became the founder, owner and director of Fit Four Recovery, serving Phoenix and Denver. The aim is to inspire those fighting drug and alcohol addiction to turn their lives around through engagement in personal fitness.

What sets Carl's approach apart from other programs is that he inspires people through his personal journey with addiction. He infuses his extensive knowledge of fitness and coaching with a drive to foster a supportive team environment. His organization has impacted hundreds of men and women who have turned their lives around through a commitment to fitness and well-being. While Carl no longer coaches on the football field, he takes great pride in "coaching on the field of life." 😿

The Upper Iowa Athletics Department celebrated its Hall of Fame Day on Sept. 9, 2023. Six former Peacocks, including four new honorees from last year's spring meetings, were inducted into the legendary group of Peacock alumni. The four newest honorees included Jill Williams '93, Jena (Kilburg) Ernst '08, Jill (Preeshl) Norton '11 and Josh McKeon '11. The quartet was joined by Rachael Schmidt '09 and Rochelle (Schmidt) Engels '09, who were recognized as part of the 2021 class of inductees.

The Hall of Fame Day celebration at UIU began at 8:15 a.m. in the Student Center Ballrooms with a social and breakfast, followed by the inductions and acceptance speeches. The six inductees were a part of Fayette's Watermelon Days Parade, as fans, friends and family gathered in downtown Fayette, or in the tailgate area. There were nearly 30 Hall of Fame members in attendance who were recognized during halftime at the Peacock's home opener against St. Ambrose University.

MEN'S SOCCER - Upper Iowa men's soccer finished the season with a 7-7-3 record overall and a 4-7-2 mark in the Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC), placing ninth. The Peacocks pulled off a notable upset when they defeated No. 7 Indianapolis 2-0 at Harms-Eischeid Stadium, handing them their only conference loss of the entire season, prior to their GLVC Tournament Championship title and progression to the Super Region Semifinal in the NCAA Division II Championships before falling to

Lewis 2-0.

The Peacocks were led by Mateo Rodriguez, who netted six goals and distributed six assists this past fall while recording a .486 shot on goal percentage. Frider Blunck netted five goals this season, and Daigo Adachi scored two goals and recorded the second-most assists in the GLVC with eight. Rodriguez was named to the All-GLVC First Team, and Daigo Adachi was named to the All-GLVC Second team. Dexter Garrett was awarded with the James R. Spalding Sportsmanship Award. UIU allowed just 1.94 goals per match behind their defenders Garrett, Florian Deick and Dan Pranger. The Peacocks saw depth in their bench, as 15 different players either scored or assisted on at least one goal this season.

WOMEN'S SOCCER - The Peacocks went 2-13-2 with a

1-10-2 conference record. They defeated William Jewell in GLVC play by a 3-2 margin and shut out non-conference opponent Minnesota-Crookston 3-0. Haylie Hutchinson led the Peacocks in assists with three, which all came in their victory over UM-Crookston. Rachyl Benavides led the team with three goals and finished second on the team with two assists.



Six Peacocks scored at least one goal on the season, while eight players recorded at least one assist. Isabelle Wagner started 14 of her 15 matches in goal, recording 70 saves. She averaged 4.67 saves per game, which was the fifth-highest in the GLVC. Maile Kapualeinani Kehano and Chloe Jarosz each played in all 17 games this season as a part of the back line for the Peacocks. Hutchinson was selected as the James R. Spalding Award Honoree for women's soccer.

WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY – The women's cross country squad competed in five meets this fall, concluding with the GLVC Championships, where they finished in 12th place. All five

Peacocks ran their 6K season highs at the Championships, led by Eryn Sabelka with a time of 26:16.30. Mackenzie Rader and Jadyn Schultz finished with times of 26:26.93 and 26:30.83, followed by Nora Nouhali (27:53.17) and (33:51.40).

The Peacocks saw their highest finish at the start of the season, when they came in sixth place at Mount Mercy and fifth place at Luther College. Sabelka finished with the best time at both these 5K meets for the Peacocks, highlighted by a 24th place finish with a time of 21:59.80 in Cedar Rapids. Schultz was the team's James R. Spalding Sportsmanship Award Honoree.

MEN AND WOMEN'S GOLF – Men's golf participated in four meets during their fall season, highlighted by third-place finishes at both Concordia-St. Paul and Winona State. The Peacocks recorded scores of 598 (+30) and 581 (+5) in their two third-place victories. Following the final meet of the year, Tate Carlson was named GLVC Player of the Week after finishing in eighth place in the 96-golfer field. He recorded scores of 71-74-69 for a total score of 214 (+1) and tied for first in scoring average on par 3s with 2.94.

Upper Iowa women's golf competed in four meets during their fall season, completing a season-best eighth-place finish at Winona State. The Peacocks recorded a score of 675 (+107) and were led by Katie Schweers, who tied for 14th place with a 158 (+16) score. UIU also finished ninth at Concordia-St. Paul and Lewis with scores of 719 (+151) and 709 (+133), respectively.



the season with an 11-17 record, going 6-8 in conference play. They faced tough competition, as the GLVC held representation in the National AVCA

rankings each week with a handful of teams. The Peacocks finished eighth place in the conference and clinched a spot in the GLVC Tournament, where they fell 3-0 to the regular season champions, University of Missouri – St. Louis.

Upper Iowa's season was highlighted by a 3-1 upset victory over Maryville on UIU's Senior Day. Zoe Semelroth finished top 10 in the GLVC in three different categories. She recorded the second-most service aces with 23, finished seventh in kills with 183 (3.52 per set) and had the ninth-best hitting percentage at .323. Nicole Pozorski dished out a total of 1,031 assists this season, averaging 9.64 per set while adding 2.51 digs per set and 31 service aces. Semelroth and Pozorski were both named to the All-GLVC Second Team.

Kaci Beesecker recorded 253 digs on the season, surpassing 1,000 career digs in her career. Madelyn Rettler was named James R. Spalding Sportsmanship Award Honoree.

he UIU Athletics Department hosted the second Peacock Power 24-Hour Challenge on Wednesday, Nov. 15, 2023. Alumni, family and friends of Peacock Athletics stepped up and generated a record amount of gifts for the second-straight year.





Two-time UIU alum plays leading role at Wisconsin's No. 1 ranked hospital

Robert "Bob" Flannery '88, '99 credits a blue-collar work ethic developed as a youngster growing up in small-town Wisconsin, two UIU degrees and a willingness to learn from others as a few reasons why he now serves on the executive team at Wisconsin's No. 1 ranked hospital.

Flannery has served as the chief financial officer for UW Health, the integrated health system of University of Wisconsin–Madison, since 2016. Serving over 700,000 patients annually, UW Health employs over 1,700 physicians and 24,000 employees in seven hospitals and at more than 70 locations. UW Health, which also is a partner in a 368,000-member health plan, was recently ranked by U.S. News & World Report as the Best Hospital in Wisconsin for the 12th consecutive year.

In his current role, Flannery has oversight of finance, managed care contracting, the physician practice plan and the revenue cycle team. He also plays a leadership role in strategic planning, including long-term planning for facility and equipment needs within the system, which currently is in various stages of development on multiple projects totaling hundreds of millions of dollars.

A career as expansive as the one he enjoys now was not immediately in the cards for Flannery after growing up and graduating from high school in the small town of Argyle, Wisconsin (pop. 850). Having worked at his uncle's farm beginning at a young age, a career in dairy farming was his immediate pursuit after graduation. However, Flannery's uncle convinced him that he need not lock into that career, which had its own set of challenges and stressors, especially in the 1980s. Flannery was convinced to enroll at Madison Business College one year after earning his high school degree. Flannery met a friend and future roommate at Madison Business College, Scott Link '88. They both received their Associate of Arts degree and then immediately enrolled at Upper Iowa's Madison location in the business program.

Flannery worked for three years in the finance department at Physicians Plus Medical Group, primarily focusing on accounts payable and payroll. Little did Flannery know that this position would lead him to a 37-year (and counting) career in health care finance administration. Link and Flannery both successfully completed their CPA exams after earning their bachelor's degrees, and Flannery eventually parlayed his experience into the role of vice president of finance at a hospital in Monroe, Wisconsin.

Ironically, this hospital was where his mother, Janice, worked for many years in the environmental services department. Flannery recalls visiting his mother in her department over many lunch hours after he became the vice president of finance. Eventually, Flannery accepted a role with UW Health in 2002, commuting first for several years before moving to Madison in 2010.

Flannery recalls receiving an excellent education during both his undergrad and graduate stints at UIU. The faculty, staff and adult learners he encountered were outstanding people. He proudly attended his commencement ceremony when receiving his Master of Arts in 1999, which he earned one year after marrying his wife, Angela, who also worked in health care finance. Bob and Angela have raised two daughters, Caitie and Alivia. Caitie is a registered nurse working for UW Health, and Alivia will be a junior at UW–Madison as a nursing student.

Rising the ranks at John Deere

After eight years toiling in the "computer room" at John Deere's Quad Cities location, **Merlin Sebastian**

'76 knew that a college degree would be necessary to reach his goal of working in the company's systems department. Originally from Postville, Sebastian was aware of Upper Iowa and took classes via UIU's Correspondence program from 1974 to 1976, including three weeks on the Fayette Campus in 1976.

"I remember Dr. Charlie Clark fondly as well as Dr. William Drake, an IT professor at UIU,"

said Sebastian. "Dr. Drake would joke with some of us who were already working fulltime with computers, which weren't all that common in the mid-1970s, that we might know more about them than he did! But there

was no question that without my UIU degree, I would not have completed a 36-year career at John Deere, primarily working in systems."

During his illustrious career, Sebastian developed processes using what were new technologies at the time, including working on the mainframe and with IBM and Tandem computers to put together warehouse systems. One of his most satisfying projects was integrating an automated storage and retrieval system into John Deere's warehouse control system. His work took him to John Deere's facilities in Germany, sparking a love of travel that would stay with him well after his career. Following his retirement from John Deere, Sebastian consulted for Rock Island Arsenal on a nearly full-time basis for eight years.

Merlin and his wife, Lynne, have been married for nearly 58 years and enjoy traveling around the world, including five trips to Japan and long cruises in different parts of the world every April. They have three kids, 12 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

'Poor country boy' to telecom executive

Phil Matthews '83 looks back with pride at a journey that took him from being born a "poor country boy" in Durham, North Carolina, to a nearly 40-year career with stops around the world in the early days of the modern telecommunications industry. Matthews began his long career with General Telephone & Electronics, once the largest independent telephone company in the U.S. and now known as Verizon, prior to earning a college degree.

"After rising to become a district manager in one of our Georgia offices," recalls Matthews, "I realized that everyone reporting to me had a college degree and that I'd need to have the same if I wanted to continue to advance."

Upper Iowa enjoyed one of its earliest corporate partnerships with GTE at the time, and Matthews was able to earn his education at his employer's expense provided he maintained a "B" average. After taking many courses via UIU's Correspondence program, Matthews spent two summer sessions in Fayette, eventually earning his degree in 1983 at the age of 42. Matthews later earned a master's degree from Dallas Baptist University, in addition to taking management training courses at both

Duke University and the University of North Carolina.

Matthews' career path included stints leading a five-state region as a general manager in Durham, a district manager position in Georgia and a business planning position at the corporate headquarters in




Member Spotlight

Scholarship initiative to benefit

n Upper lowa University education will become even more affordable for 10 members of each of UIU's next two incoming classes thanks to the generous support of Ralph and Erica Kauten.

Kauten, a native of rural Fayette County and student at UIU in the late '60s and early '70s, has committed \$500,000 to establish the Kauten Scholars program at UIU. The scholarship initiative aligns the charitable priorities of the Kautens with the strategic priorities of UIU. The generous contribution will be used to award annual scholarships to 10 qualifying students from each of the two incoming classes. The fortunate Kauten Scholars recipients will receive up to \$24,000 in tuition aid funded by this program during their four-year educational journey at UIU, provided they remain in good academic standing.

The Kauten Scholars initiative is a continuation of UIU's efforts to make a quality college degree accessible at an affordable price. In 2021, UIU announced the Peacock Promise initiative, which makes tuition free for any lowa student who qualifies for the lowa Tuition Grant. The Kauten Scholars program will target students who do not meet the income requirements for the lowa Tuition Grant but who still demonstrate financial need.

Kauten co-founded or led several startup companies in the life sciences and biotechnology industries. He is currently the owner of Air-Lec Industries and co-owner of Mirus Bio. He has previously co-founded or served in a leadership role at Promega Corporation, PanVera Corporation, Mirus Bio, Quintessence Biosciences Inc., and Lucigen Corporation. The Kautens currently live

in Madison, Wisconsin, where Ralph serves as a board member for several private and public organizations in the Madison area. However, he continues to care deeply about the rural Northeast Iowa region where he grew up as the youngest of 11 children on a family farm near Fayette.

"Strengthening and adding vitality to rural communities is important, and institutions like Upper Iowa University are a critical part of keeping places like Fayette alive," said Kauten. "Erica and I are proud to provide these scholarships, which will not only help UIU students but also assist in growing UIU's Fayette Campus."

Kauten Scholars recipients will be selected by a small committee with representation from the UIU faculty and the admissions, financial aid, and advancement departments. Kauten Scholars will receive the UIU Merit Scholarship that they are eligible to receive based on past academic performance plus an additional Kauten Scholars tuition award, for a combined \$6,000 annual aid package. Students may also be eligible for additional aid during their UIU career, such as Honors & Awards scholarships, further reducing their tuition costs.

Preference will be given to students coming to Fayette from rural-serving school districts who also demonstrate financial need but who are not eligible for UIU's Peacock

Promise scholarship, which makes tuition free at the Fayette Campus. Since the creation of the Peacock Promise program, UIU has increased the number of Iowa residents attending the Fayette Campus by over 90%.

"Because of Ralph and Erica's support, the Kauten Scholars initiative will provide our Admissions team with an important recruitment tool while enhancing our ability to make a college degree attainable to students who might otherwise not be able to afford one," said Kathy Wenthold, executive director of admissions and retention. "We are excited to meet the first cohort of Kauten Scholars students during this year's recruitment season and look forward to celebrating their successes at UIU and as alumni in the years ahead."

The gift establishing the Kauten Scholars initiative is not the first time the Kautens have lent their support to UIU and area students. In 2012, Ralph and Erica established the Ralph Kauten Endowed Scholarship at UIU, which has gone on to support six West Central and North Fayette-Valley graduates who went on to attend Upper Iowa. Nearly \$20,000 has been awarded from this endowed scholarship, and it has produced UIU alumni who are now enjoying careers spanning fields from law to teaching.

"I understand the value of investing in educational opportunities that can help to change lives," said Kauten. "This has been true for me as a prior UIU endowed scholar and with our 2012 endowed scholarship program at UIU. We are happy to hopefully make an even larger impact with the Kauten Scholars program."



ongtime UIU Athletics booster **Darwin Dean '99** cemented his legacy at his alma mater by establishing the Darwin Dean Endowed Scholarship late in 2023. The endowment will support a scholarship for a female student-athlete, with the first recipient to be acknowledged at the 2024 Honors & Awards Banquet in April. The recipient must have a 3.0 GPA or higher and will be a rising junior or senior participating in athletics at UIU.

Dean, who lives in Fayette, is an ardent and passionate fan of the Peacocks. He can almost always be found in the same section of bleachers in Dorman Gymnasium to cheer on the volleyball and basketball teams or at his familiar perch in the Harms-Eischeid Stadium Suites for football games. His devotion and faithfulness to women's athletics at UIU extends back over a decade, with years of consistent and generous support for all women's sports.

In addition to the legacy Dean will leave with his endowed scholarship, this faithful alumnus has been recognized

for his support of a variety of projects benefiting UIU Athletics, including equipment enhancements at the Peacock Arts & Athletics Center and the UIU Softball field.

Dean attended UIU's Fayette Campus as an adult learner, earning a degree in management information systems in 1999. He is a proud member of UIU's Heritage Society and has been recognized as a member of UIU's Donor Club every year since the program's inception.

"If I hadn't gotten the opportunity to attend UIU and instead had stayed in the Dallas area, my life would be very different today," said Sanders. "I loved everything about my experience at UIU."

Sanders recalls having two internship opportunities offered during his senior year; one with Pfizer and the other with Valley Fair amusement park in Minnesota. He opted for the Pfizer gig and the company offered him a full-time job in February of his senior year. Sanders has balanced a successful career with a desire to give back to his community. In addition to their recent gift to establish an endowment at UIU, the young couple support scholarships for students from Deo's high school who are headed to college. 
